# PALMETTO PIPES & DRUMS CHANTER & BAND PRACTICE

#### **Objective**

Monday night chanter practices have always been designed in such a way as to provide students with an informal and fun setting in which to learn how to play the bagpipes. This will continue. However, a number of changes will be implemented to promote learning in a more standardized manner.

# Five Class Levels Lead to Band Membership

Soon after the beginning of 2003, chanter students will be asked to perform on the practice chanter in front of a panel of instructors (day and time TBA) to determine in which Grade they should be placed. Beginning, intermediate and advanced students will find themselves in one of five categories. These Grades have not been designed as a mechanism to divide the band but rather as a way to facilitate the teaching and learning of the Great Highland Bagpipes. A student will know that he/she is at the same Grade of playing as other people in his/her class.

Grade 5: Beginning Chanter (Basic musical knowledge, "the big notes,"

**Grade 4:** Embellishments (All gracenotes, doublings, grips, etc., with easy

**Grade 3:** Six Basic Tunes: (Memorization of first tunes: *Hyfrodol, The Day* 

Thou Hast Giv'n, Brown Haired Maiden, High Road to Gairloch,

Mairi's Wedding, God Bless America

Grade 2: Beginning Bagpipes (Blowing, instrument maintenance, applying

everything from Grades 5, 4 & 3 to the pipes.)

**Grade 1:** Remainder of Basic Band Tunes (Tier I)

Band: Band Curriculum (Intermediate and Advanced Tunes (Tiers II &

III, Seasonal Tunes)

### **Demonstration of Mastery**

When a teacher and student agree that the student is ready to graduate to the next Grade, the student will demonstrate mastery of specific knowledge and skills to a panel of instructors. A successful exhibition will result in graduation to the next Grade. The criteria will focus on the following: open embellishments, tempo, correct playing (has the student memorized the tunes satisfactorily?)

For the benefit of current students, this audition process will be implemented <u>after</u> the month of January, 2003. This time will give current students and teachers a chance to determine which grade and class is best suited for each individual student.

# PALMETTO PIPES & DRUMS DETAILED REQUIREMENTS

## **GRADE 5**

Use Sandy Jones' Beginning the Bagpipe.

Students in Grade 5 will be working on basic musical knowledge and the notes.

Emphasis for this Grade: correct and CLEAR execution (beware of crossing noises)

### Requirements for graduation to the next Grade:

- 1) Names of the notes (students should be able to identify each of the nine notes on a staff)
- 2) Differences between whole-note, half-note, quarter-note, eighth-note, sixteenth-note, thirty-second-note and the "dot"
- Time signatures (students should be able to explain what a time signature of 2/4, 3/4, 4/4, 6/8, etc. means)
- 4) Finger posture (dos and don'ts)
- 5) Be able to play Page 14 of Sandy Jones' *Beginning the Bagpipe* well and without crossing noises (this is the main requirement for this Grade)

Students in Grade 4 will be working on gracenotes and embellishments. In addition students will tackle a couple of easy tunes integrating some of the gracenotes and embellishments.

Keep on practicing what you have learned in Grade 5.

Emphases for this Grade: *OPEN embellishments*, tempo, correct and CLEAR execution (beware of crossing noises)

# Requirements for graduation to the next Grade:

- 1) Good OPEN execution of each of the gracenotes and embellishments found on "Grade 4 Daily Exercises."
- 2) Be able to play *Scots Wha Hae* and *Amazing Grace* well and without crossing noises **from memory** (focus on OPEN embellishments, tempo and correct execution).

Students in Grade 4 will be working on six basic tunes found in Tier I of the band repertoire. Students in the grade will also receive a copy of the official band repertoire book, a ring binder with all the current tunes being played by the band.

### Keep on practicing what you have learned in Grades 5 and 4.

Emphases for this Grade: Correct memorization of tunes, and playing them with *OPEN embellishments*, steady tempo, correct and CLEAR execution (**beware of crossing noises**)

# **Grade 3 Curriculum:**

Students in Grade 2 will familiarize themselves with the Great Highland Bagpipes.

Keep on practicing what you have learned in Grades 5, 4 and 3.

Emphases for this Grade: *OPEN embellishments*, tempo, correct and CLEAR execution (beware of crossing noises)

## Requirements for graduation to the next Grade:

- 1) Demonstrate knowledge of the instrument (What is the name of each part? How does the instrument work? Etc.)
- 2) Be able to tune up the instrument (chanter and drones)
- 3) Show familiarity with maintenance techniques
- 4) Be able to play everything you have learned in Grades 5 to 3 on the bagpipes (this is the main requirement for this Grade)

# **Grade 2 Curriculum:**

  - b) Blow pipe
  - c) Chanter
  - d) Bag (types of bags)
- e) Reeds (drone and chanter)

Students in Grade 1 will be working on the remainder of the Tier I tunes.

Keep on practicing what you have learned in Grades 5, 4, 3 and 2.

Emphases for this Grade: *OPEN embellishments*, tempo, correct and CLEAR execution (beware of crossing noises)

1) Be able to play the tunes below well and **from memory** (focus on OPEN embellishments, tempo and correct execution)
